

## Learning Points – What’s a Little Double Squeeze Among Friends?

Lorna and I decided to practice before playing in the Flying Pig Regional Knockout Events next week. We play a 2/1 card and found Pasteboards a great time to check out all those little agreements that we might never discuss. Besides we like the people we play with and the food is pretty good too! ### Bidding

North’s 1♦ opening is typical of 2/1 and many standard systems. A 1♦ opening bid typically promises 4 cards - the only time we open 1♦ with 3 cards would be when holding a 4=4=3=2 hand. (Some open 1♦ on 3 when holding ♦AKx & ♣xxx. Be sure to get on the same page with your partner).

### The Play

Declarer can count 6 tricks off the top with 2 or 3 more available in ♦. Declarer would like the defense to open ♣ first to guarantee a trick. West led a small ♠ signaling length in the suit. Declarer let this ride around to the ♠Q (East contributed the ♠10). The ♦Q quickly lost to the offside ♦K and East cashed the ♣K and switched to a small ♥. South won with the ♥A. Declarer now counts 8 tricks. East’s play in ♣ makes forcing a trick in that suit likely but no guarantee. No worries. Let’s run the free suit (♦) and see what develops. South led a ♣ toward the ♣Q, won by East with the ♣A. East returned the ♣10, won by south with the ♣J. Here’s the position after trick 9→

Now the stage was set. With the loser count down to one, and with ♠ guarded by west and ♣ by East, ♥ might or might not be guarded by both. The double squeeze (if it exists and it does) and a ♥ - ♣ simple squeeze against East will play the same from this point forward.

South led the small spade to dummy’s ♠A and K. On the lead of the ♠K, East discarded a ♥ and South discarded the lone ♣, its work done. A small ♥ to the ♥K brought the ♥Q from East and the ♥J from West. The ♥10 scored the overtrick for a top board.

### Post Mortem

You be the judge. Once East cashes a ♣, declarer’s focus shifts to overtricks. If East plays either a 2<sup>nd</sup> ♠ or a 2<sup>nd</sup> ♥ when in the 2<sup>nd</sup> time, communications will become very difficult for the double squeeze.

### Learning Pointers:

- 1) When the evidence builds to a squeeze, DO IT! At no cost, you might just earn a top.
- 2) When defending, eliminate transportation in either the Right (♠) or Both (♥) suit instead of developing tricks in the Left Suit (♣) – you might just break up that double squeeze before declarer sees it coming.
