Bridge is such a fascinating game in part because you can never tell when something unusual might happen with even the most inocuous hand. On this deal from the final of the top bracket of the Charity Knockout Teams, one of the defenders made a subtle error that came back to haunt him in a big way. Malcolm Brachman, playing with Mike Passell, brought home a grand slam that should have gone down.

West led a low ♥, and East discarded a ♦. Brachman had 12 top tricks and few prospects for a 13th unless a squeeze materialized. Hoping for the best, Brachman ran off

♣ discard by West transferred responsibility for guarding ♣s to East, who was subjected to a black-suit squeeze in the end. Brachman chalked up plus 1510. The ♣7 was his 13th trick. After hearing that the deal was reported as a "fun hand," Brachman remarked, "It wasn't fun until the 13<sup>th</sup> trick." South can see 12 tricks when North supports ♥s, and hopes for the ♠A to pitch the ♠ loser. The ♠ or ♦Q, or a squeeze makes 13 tricks.

**4**<sup>th</sup> **Suit Forcing** (4SF) by Responder asks for either 3 card support for their Major and implies no NT stopper in the 4<sup>th</sup> suit. Opener's priorities are:

- 1) Raise responder's Major with 3 cards.
- 2) Bid NT with a stopper in the 4<sup>th</sup> suit.
- 3) Rebid a 6+ card 1st suit or 5+ card 2nd suit
- 4) Raise the 4<sup>th</sup> suit with 4-cards
- 5) Rebid 1<sup>st</sup> suit when no other bid works.

4SF is OFF after a Game Forcing Bid. 4SF is Game forcing or invitational (You choose). 4SF by a passed hand always invites. 1♣-1♥-1♥-1♠ is NOT 4SF.



Here's a hand showing the power of distribution. Roman Keycard Blackwood a very powerful way to investigate slam.



Bidding –North deals and South opens 1 ◆ holding 15 HCPs and a very distributional hand. North responds 1 ♥. South bids 1 ▲ showing their 4 card ▲ suit. North knows they have an 8 card ▲ fit and can reevaluate to 12 support points: 10 HCPs plus 2 for the ◆ doubleton. With 12 support points opposite partners 12-14 HCP open North will jump to either 3 ▲ (shows 10-12 and invitational to 4 ♠) or straight to 4 ♠. South's hand is worth roughly 19 support points: 15 HCPs plus 3 points for the ♥ void Contract Scores MPs

Play of the hand – The bad 4-1 trump break makes this hand a little more difficult to play but 6 a can still be made by drawing 3 rounds of trump and then running +s in the south hand until West is forced to ruff. Then you can get back to South with the ♣A and resume running ♦s to make 12 tricks. Note if opponents start with a 🕏 lead you will want to win that 1st trick in the North hand to save the A entry in South to get to those good +s.

Roman Keycard Blackwood - Roman Key is an improvement over Blackwood. The Blackwood Convention is a way to ask for partners aces and kings in exploration of slam.

Standard Blackwood Responses to 4NT:	Roman Keycard Blackwood Responses to 4NT:
5♣ = 0 or 4 Aces (you can tell how many your partner has)	5♣ = 0 or 3 Keycards
5♦ = 1 Aces	5+ = 1 or 4 Keycards
5 <b>♥</b> = 2 Aces	5♥ = 2 or 5 Keycards without the queen of trump
5 <b>♠</b> = 3 Aces	5 = 2  or  5  Keycards with the queen of trump
If you have all 4 Aces then they can rebid 5NT to ask for	Note: The 5 keycards are the 4 As & the trump K.

Post Mortem - I am not a big fan of playing lots of conventions but Roman Keycard Blackwood is one definitely worth adding to your partnership agreements. Knowing if you have the trump K is just as valuable as an ace when considering slam.
