Bob Jones 3NT Should you want to pursue a possible slam, then 4 is your bid. We don't think the hand or the suit are worth a move. Bid 3NT.

Steve Vogel 3NT Partner has 5 spades, and therefore 8 cards in the other suits. Usually, partner will have at least 5 cards in hearts and clubs, leaving at most 3 cards in diamonds. We might possibly have a fit in diamonds, but I don't have the room to find out whether we do and how good the fit might be. I think it best to sign off in 3NT.

Joe Muenks 3NT I think we've made our bed so let's sleep. However, if you have the tools and if you almost never open 2NT with a singleton, I would've offered a diamond slam (note, partner's rejection of the diamond slam lands in 4NT, which should be very safe with this nice assortment).

Bob Fisk 6NT I wish I was playing Precision. Partner would have opened 1e, and I would have been able to show $3+$ controls ( $A=$ two, $K=o n e$ ), 1-4-6-2 distribution, and then shown both Aces and the PQ during a keycard sequence. In the absence of that, I'll simply guess what might make. I guess 6NT opposite Kxxxx AK KQJ KJx. 6 obviously has merit, but this is matchpoints.

Steve Moese 3NT Perhaps 6 will make, but it requires partner to hold very specific cards. Partner's shape is 5S - (332). We need something like KQJ10x KJx AKJ Kx from partner to make 12 tricks. KQ109x AK AQJ Jxx fails. Even 4NT could be in trouble.

Mike Ma 3NT The way I play, 4 now would be natural with slam interest. But this D suit is wrong to do that, especially after partner has shown 5 S .. So 3 NT it is. If you miss slam, so be it. 2NT is not called slam killer for nothing.

Bob Jones Pass The point count falls within the weak two-bid range, but this hand does not look like a pre-empt to us. Pass.

Steve Vogel Pass Is this a trick question? I see no basis for any other bid in $1^{\text {st }}$ seat.
Joe Muenks 2 We'll trade suit quality for points and try for 8 tricks. Passing may make it hard to catch up, though I hate my preempt, also, when partner leads a diamond. Oh, well, sometimes bridge is like poker and we take a gamble.

Bob Fisk Pass This hand isn't worth opening 2 even if you still play that as a weak two. If partner opens 1 NT , we'll be in game.

Steve Moese Pass Thinking is an overbid. Definitely NOT a vulnerable preempt.
Mike Ma Pass Opening 2 would be wrong on so many counts. Red vs white. Terrible suit. Values more useful for defense than offense. etc etc.

Bob Jones 1NT It would be easy to open and bid your spades later, but this looks like a no trump hand to us. Open 1 NT .

Steve Vogel 1NT If my 4-card major were hearts, I would consider 1NT to be the best opening bid by a wide margin. With clubs and spades, opening 1 is a reasonable alternative, but I still prefer opening 1 NT with this balanced hand containing 15-17 points.

Joe Muenks 1ie With 4 spades and a convenient rebid, there is no reason to distort our distribution with a 1 NT opening.

Bob Fisk 1NT (15-17). Nothing else occurs to me.
Steve Moese 1NT Avoid the rebid problem. This is a balanced hand in range for a strong NT.

Mike $\mathrm{Ma} \quad$ 1NT Opening 1NT with $4 \mathrm{M}+5 \mathrm{~m}$ is fine unless all your values are concentrated in your two suits It is true when your $M$ is $S$, you can open 1 m and rebid 1 a over $1 \bigvee$, but why make life difficult when with one bid you can tell partner your values and shape? And what if partner responds 1 NT to your 1 m ( $8-10$ or 6-10 depending on your system)?

Bob Jones 1 Don't even think about a weak two bid. This hand is too good. Open $1 \mathbb{1}$.
Steve Vogel 1V One heart seems like the overwhelmingly correct opening bid, as I have an easy rebid of $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ over 1 NT or 2 of a minor. Of course, I would support spades if partner responds 14.

Joe Muenks $1 \boldsymbol{1}$ I'm going to open $1 \mathbb{V}$ and rebid $2 \boldsymbol{V}$ over almost any reply other than $1 \boldsymbol{4}$. It's true that our singleton $\$ K$ doesn't deliver our other 0.5 defensive tricks for the rule of 20/22 but with 12 HCP we'll proceed.

Bob Fisk 17 Not sure why this one is in here, so nobody will open $2 \sqrt{V}$ and nobody will pass. Is someone going to psych 12? Awesome!!

Steve Moese 1 Too many Major cards to pass.
Mike Ma $\quad$ 1『 Are you seriously considering passing with this hand because your $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ is singleton?

Bob Jones 3e You could cleverly pass, hoping to lead a fourth-best club against a notrump contract, but those plans seldom work out. Put pressure on your opponents by bidding 3.

Steve Vogel 30 This one is interesting. If the opponents stay in notrump, perhaps it is best to remain silent and set them, but that to me seems against the odds. Playing DONT, my options are to double (one-suited hand) or to bid 3e. I prefer to take up more space and bid 32.

Joe Muenks 2e If is natural, by all means bid it. If playing DONT, you can $X$. If your only club bid is $3 \&$ or takes you to $3 \&$, pass if your opponents' total combined masterpoints exceed 1.0 (one) because you are going for a number.

Bob Fisk Pass It's possible that your opponents will try and play in 3NT if they don't find a major-suit fit. If they do, you should take a few minutes contemplating your opening lead before you play the (Fourth from my longest and strongest, partner). Heh. Oh, and if they end up in $4 \vee$ or $4 \boldsymbol{Q}$, bid 5 like a boss.

Steve Moese Pass If we had a penalty double of a strong NT that would be interesting. Most do not. Pass is best. Preempting to when vulnerability is unfavorable is unwise. 27-29 HCP are accounted for, leaving 5.5-6.5 for responder and our partner. Going negative when vulnerable risks a bad MP score especially when a game their way seems unlikely.

Mike $\mathrm{Ma} \quad \underline{\mathbf{X}} \quad$ Hopefully your system allows a penalty X here. An unsuspecting LHO will pass or even XX (if natural) holding $8-9$ points. If they bid over the $X$, I will bid my C suit. Partner should know what is happening. If $I$ play DONT or something similar, I will bid now. A gambling 3NT is a bit rich for me in this vulnerability.

Bob Jones 4- This is a simple hand, so make a simple bid. Bid 4V.
Steve Vogel 4V I have just enough strength to bid game, so I will communicate that to partner by going directly to game. If I had extras, I would bid 2 \& first ( $4^{\text {th }}$ suit forcing) and proceed more slowly to game (or slam).

Joe Muenks 4V You do not have a diamond control, so your jump shows 13-16 playing points and 3 hearts. If partner's rebid, which ranges 12-18, is on the high side and they have the diamond control, they are welcome to move towards slam.

Bob Fisk 4V Partner has already indicated that they have an unbalanced hand (i.e., they would have rebid 1 NT with 5-3-3-2 shape), so you have no reason to mess around on the way to game. Partner's most likely shape is $1-5-3-4$.

Steve Moese 2- 4th suit forcing to game.
Mike Ma 4V Over the 1 I opening, I already upgraded $m y$ hand to $G F$, and even more so now opener shows C . I need too much from partner given the $2 \boldsymbol{e}$ rebid (does not have to be minimum, but denies JS hand) to think about slam, so $4 \vee$ it is.
