Cincinnati Flying Pig Regional

Our Cincinnati Flying Pig Regional Tournament, yes "Ours" because it belongs to all the members of our unit, is fast approaching. It will be held at the Delta Hotel on Chester

road from Jun 4th to June 9th and here at the CBC on Cooper road on June 10th.

This will be my last appeal before the tournament.

I ask all the members to come together and help in any way possible. We are still looking for volunteer and/or monetary help.

Volunteers

We need volunteers for the registration and the partnership desk. We are trying to get as many people as possible. This way the burden does not fall only on few people and the desk staff can still participate and play in the tournament. We are trying to keep the desk open before each session from Sunday to Friday.

Monetary

We are requesting for donations to defray the cost of hospitality and the gift baskets.

Method Bridge

Most bridge students first learn point count and apply it to various bidding systems and conventions. They then learn to count the points around the table. But did you know that the shape of a bridge hand is just as important, if not more important than points, especially when declaring or defending a hand?

The following illustration comes from my new book about shapes, entitled Method Bridge. In the book I introduce the idea that memorizing the shapes of hands and suits is similar to Method Acting (developed by Konstantin Stanislovski in the early 20th Century) — once you know the shapes, you don't have to count; instead you picture them.

Everybody's hand has 13 cards with four suits and there are four suits distributed around the table with 13 cards in each suit, so the patterns are the same. If you can picture a shape of a suit or a hand, instead of counting to 13, you will make life easier on your brain, and you'll have more time to concentrate on your strategies and goals. The top five bridge shapes in order of frequency are:

One particular shape that can help you enormously to play a hand is the 5-5 shape, especially when it's one of your opponents who describes a 5-5. On this hand, West uses Michaels, showing at least 5-5 shape, but you buy the contract in a slam!

West leads the ♥Q against your slam. Keep in mind he has shown 5-5 with five hearts and a minor. You win the king and draw trumps in three rounds, as West follows once and discards a heart and a club on the second and third round of spades.

You now have an endplay on either opponent. You cash your ace of hearts and ruff a heart. It is as if West has literally shown you his hand. He has shown five hearts and one spade, so he has 5-2 shape in the minors one way or the other. And so does his partner, East. You can visualize this when you become familiar with the second most frequent shape, 5332. You have 3-3 in both minors between your hand and dummy. If West has five, his partner has two: 5332 around the table in that suit. If West has two, his partner has five: again 5332 around the table.

So you can cash the AK and AK. Then play a loser in either minor. If West wins, he will give you a ruff-sluff, and if East wins, he will also give you a ruff-sluff. Study this hand and put it in your memory-recall, as Stanislovski would call it.

Interestingly, this hand can be played correctly without any bidding by the opponents, with the help of the Method. In the auction I gave, West provided a clue by using Michaels. But really you don't need that clue if you know your shapes. When dummy comes down, you can see you have two losers, one in each minor suit. But how will those minor suits divide around the table? They might be 4333 or they might be 5332. If the latter, you can make the contract by playing the hand the same way as described: Draw trump, ruff out the hearts, cash the two A-K's and play a minor-suit loser. If the two minor suits are 5332 around the table, they are likely to be split (one five-card suit on your right and one

on your left). So someone will win the minor-suit trick and be forced to concede a ruff-sluff. For example, the hand might look like this:

FORCING PASS

Sounds like a contradiction in terms doesn't it? Don't we pass when we are too weak to bid? Forcing Pass seems to be a bridge oxymoron.

Let's take a closer look at this important bidding tool. We will want to add this to our competitive bidding arsenal.

Suppose we are dealt something like:



We open 1♠ and left-hand opponent (LHO) decides to preempt with 3♠. Partner bids 4♠, a game force with a good hand and very likely spade support. Irritatingly, right-hand opponent (RHO)

bids 5. What now? How do we show a hand that is very good given the bidding that has some slam interest with the right hand from partner?

We have the choice of several calls. We can Pass, we can double, and we can bid some number of

Spades on our own. Before reading on, decide what you would do.

Obviously, you want to tell partner something like: I have a good hand for my bidding so far, with no wasted values in their suit.

The way to do that is with a **FORCING PASS**.

A FORCING PASS says: "I have a good hand for my previous bidding and no wasted values in their suit. We must not let the opponents play undoubled. Please help decide whether to double or bid on, partner."

When we have shown a game force, or when we have shown invitational values and they bid to the 5-level (or are clearly preempting) we play that a pass immediately over their interference by either partner is FORCING.

Here our side showed game forcing values (4. Is a game force) and opponents have bid to the 5-level. Opener's pass is FORCING. With:

♣ AJ 32♥ A6♦ AQ109

987

Partner will know that there is no wastage in clubs, but they will not be sure about our side's control of the ♣ suit. (A control stops them from taking two tricks in a suit. A control can be an Ace, King, singleton or void). One way to find out is to offer 5 to

show a ◆ control (◆A). Now opener can bid 5♥ to show both a ♥ control and a ♣ control (the suit that responder passed over). Yes, a singleton in their suit is a "control" for slam purposes. Now responder has no trouble bidding the excellent spade slam that the preempting opponents tried to stop us from finding.

★ KQ976

(Aside: Notice that only 29 HCP makes 12 tricks. We "know" this because there is no wastage in clubs, we can lose at most one club trick when spades are

trump, and all 29 HCP are working. Indeed if you replace our ♥Q and partner's ♠J with spot cards, a small slam is still a sound contract. Rule of 26: If you have an 8+ card

trump fit, and can count 26 HCP in three suits, and only one loser in the fourth, check for keycards and be ready to bid a makeable slam. Here the check for keycards was done by control bidding not Blackwood or Roman Keycard Blackwood. Our opponents bidding took that possibility away. Indeed, either took is a poorer approach to finding slam here because the key is the singleton club – something we cannot tell partner about except in a disciplined control bidding auction. But I digress).

Change opener's hand to:

and opener bids 5♠ not 5♥ over responder's 5♦ because our side has no club control.



Change responder's hand to:

and responder will **DOUBLE** instead of control bidding a red suit, saying "I've heard what you said partner and we are beating 5. enough to make up for our



game bonus". Partner's double says "I have wasted values in their suit, or I have a bare minimum for my previous calls."

Let's consider a different auction. This time we are vulnerable and they are not.

What should we do now, holding the same hand as before?


First, we look at the requirements for a forcing pass to decide if this is a forcing pass situation.

- 1) Do we have a fit? YES!
- 2) Did our opponents bid to the 5 level? YES!
- 3) Did we show invitational values or a GF in our auction? NO!

THIS ISN'T A FORCING PASS AUCTION. Note partner had the choice to make a stronger bid of 4♣ to create the forcing pass opportunity. They chose not to do that. Some experts consider this a forcing pass auction because we are vulnerable and bid a game freely. Perhaps that's a reasonable choice. However sometimes partner will have:

We make 4.4 but they might well be making 5.4.

Consider something like:



Opponents can make a small slam in clubs! Our best choice is to let them play in 5♣ missing their slam bonus! Partner's jump to 4♠ did its iob to make a smooth

constructive auction impossible. Having a FORCING PASS here would cause partner to double when PASS is the only right call.

Here are a few more auctions. Decide which ones show a forcing pass and which ones do not:

Here is what I think each of the above auctions show:

- 1) NOT A FORCING PASS our opponents have not bid to the 5 level and we have only shown invitational values.
- 2) NOT A FORCING PASS while 1N was forcing, we are not forces to game and partner has NOT shown invitational values (yet).
- 3) DEPENDS If you are playing 2/1 Game Force this is a FOCING PASS because we are in a game forcing auction. If you play Standard American, this is NOT A FORCING PASS auction. Bidding agreements matter!
- 4) NOT A FORCING PASS with an invitation, partner would bid 2♠ not 3♥.
- 5) FORCING PASS here is a situation below game where partner has forced us to the 3 level by using the invitational cuebid. Many players would think "Pass shows weakness and bidding shows strength". Think about that for a moment. Bidding 3 says I decline your invitation (I am not strong enough to go to game). Since bidding 3 shows weakness many experts define the pass here as forcing. This makes a double by opener for penalties.

One additional observation. When a forcing pass is available, a double is PENALTY.

Let's review what we have learned:

- 1) A FORCING PASS consults partner as to the best course of action.
- 2) Once we issue a forcing pass, either we will declare or they will be doubled. Passing the auction out undoubled not in the cards.
- 3) A FORCING PASS can occur in several different auctions.

Criteria for a FORCING PASS:

- 1) We have shown a Game Forcing Auction
- 2) We have shown invitational values, and they have bid to the 5-level

- 3) We have shown invitational values and they have bid below 3 of our agreed suit.
- 4) They are clearly preempting even the janitor knows they are preempting.

Watchouts:

- Like all good agreements, be sure to discuss the FORCING PASS in detail with partner before adopting them.
- 2) Doubling too often can give good scores to opponents. Use the guidelines. Consider the auction. Don't double just because you have been outbid or have a minimum hand.



Bidding Quiz - Answers

Q1 – Neither vulnerable ♠K 8 5 ♥K 8 ♦A K T 7 5 ♣K J T SOUTH WEST NORTH EAST ?



Bob Jones 1 → The 5-card suit and the 2 working 10's make this hand too good for 1NT.

Open 1 →, intending to rebid 2NT.

Steve Vogel 1 → This hand is worth 18+ points, 17HCP plus additional points for the good 5-card diamond suit as well as the 10's in the minors. Accordingly, I believe it is too strong for a 1NT opening. My plan is to open 1 → with the expectation of rebidding 2NT over partner's expected 1-level response.


Joe Muenks 1 → The T with the J and T in a good 5 card suit lead me to upgrade this hand as an 18 pointer, so I open 1 → and bid 2NT next. Starting 1 → means essentially forcing any 6 pt hand to game whereas opening 1NT is where you'll play it if partner has 6 or 7. This hand feels like one that will make many times when partner has fewer than 8.

Bob Fisk 1 or poing to rebid 2NT. While this hand is technically in the 15-17 range, it behaves more like a hand in the 18-19 HCP range. If you generate 20 7-HCP hands for partner, I'm willing to bet that 18.4 of them will have a strong chance to make 3NT opposite this hand. Let's make one randomly--Jxx Qxx Qxx Qxxx. Sweet.

- 1♦ offers two advantages:
- 1) We have a clearer path to a slam if right, and
- 2) We will bid making games and slams that others might miss.

Otto Walter 1 - Opening 1 diamond allows your to rebid 2NT showing 18-19 points. That gives partner a better picture of your hand.

Q 2 – North-South vulnerable ♠9 8 7 ♥7 3 ♦J 9 8 5 4 2 ♣7 6 NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST 1NT P ?



Bob Jones <u>2NT</u> This hand will probably play at least 3 tricks better in diamonds than in no trump. Use whatever method you have to sign off in diamonds. For us, it is 2NT – a transfer to diamonds.

Steve Vogel <u>2NT</u> (Diamonds) This is a close call. We may be better off in a 1NT contract versus a 3-level diamond contract, but I believe the odds favor the higher level diamond contract, given my lack of help in all other suits. In imps, I might be more inclined to pass 1NT, and hope partner has a decent source of tricks.

Joe Muenks <u>2NT</u> This is close to just pass and let partner struggle, but the opponents probably have a major partial they could find, so I'll play 3 (or partner will) and I assume we'll get 2 more tricks with diamonds trump than in no trump. Scary hand, though.

Bob Fisk <u>2NT</u> (Diamonds). I play this as a transfer to Diamonds. If partner bids 3♦, I'll pass. If partner bids 3♣ (i.e., partner is allergic to Diamonds), I'll bid 3♦. Bridge is easy!

Steve Moese <u>Pass</u> 7 tricks will be hard, but 9 tricks will be even tougher. Since we have no way to stop in 2♦, I will pass and hope they reopen. The vulnerability stops me from transferring to 3♦.

Bob Jones $2 \checkmark$ Opening $1 \checkmark$ in third position would not be a crime, but we prefer to ramp up the pressure and take advantage of the position and the vulnerability. Open $2 \checkmark$.

Steve Vogel 1 Third seat non-vulnerable, I definitely want to take the opportunity to get partner off to a heart lead if the opponents buy the contract, or we could end up buying the contract.

Joe Muenks <u>Pass</u> We love to stretch to open in 3rd seat and even 4th seat at times, but I'll be a little better than this to open myself like 11 HCP in a square hand or a rule of 20/22 hand or a rule of 15 hand with spades.

Bob Fisk $\underline{1}$ Light 3rd-seat opener. I'd open 2 if you took away my \bullet K.

Steve Moese $\underline{\mathbf{1}}$ 3rd seat this is a fine 1-level opening.



Bob Jones $\underline{4} \triangleq$ This hand is not quite worth a slam try. Just bid $4 \triangleq$.


Steve Vogel 4♠ Another close call. Based on the bidding (partner did not bid 2♥ over Stayman), I expect partner to have 4 spades, 2-3 hearts and, therefore, 6-7 cards in the minors. My 3 small clubs are a big liability, making slam unlikely. Yes, partner could have the perfect hand for slam, but if I invite (by bidding 3♥ in our system), we will get to an unmakeable slam too often. If I had the ♠Q instead of the Jack, I would invite slam.

Joe Muenks 5♠ You might play this differently with different partners, but you are on the cusp of slam points, your off suit is phenomenal but you cannot ask aces with 2 quick losers in even ONE suit, and we have 2 wretched suits, so we'll offer a general spade slam try and announce our 2 quick loser problem.

Bob Fisk 3 I play that a bid of three of the other major in an auction that begins 1NT-2 ; 2M shows strong slam interest in partner's major (Baze). This allows the auction 1NT-2 ; 2M-4NT to be purely quantitative (i.e., I had the other major and around 16 HCP). It also allows the auction 1NT-2 ; 2M-4 to show strong slam interest in partner's major and a splinter in Clubs.

Steve Moese 4♠ This is a great hand opposite 4 spade cards and partner could have just the right cards to make a small slam. But look closer. Give partner A752 AJ2 109 AKJ6 and slam still requires two finesses and a 3-2 trump break. That's well under 17% by my rough calculation. We need something like Q752 AK2 109 AKJ6 opposite and even that is at

best 34%!! (68% trumps are 3-2 times 50% for the onside extchind Q).




Bob Jones 1 Bid 1 Should they persist in clubs, you can double at your next turn without showing extra values.

Steve Vogel X The big question is whether to overcall 1♥ or double (yet another close call). My heart suit is very strong, suggesting the overcall, but given my void, if partner has 4 spades, a 4-4 fit will tend to play better than a 5-3 fit where I may lose trump control. I would choose a takeout double (and hope partner does not pass with club length).

Joe Muenks 1 Double, burying your 5th heart will often work to find the best trump suit, but I'll see if partner has 3 hearts this round and if not I hope I can double next time to show support everywhere. Or if West declares spades or NT I've gotten partner off to a good lead.

Steve Moese $1 \lor$ I prefer to show my 5-card Major when I can. Here I can rebid spades when appropriate. By the way, agree to allow partner to bid $1 \spadesuit$ on 4 cards here as if they did not open the bidding (($1 \spadesuit$) - $1 \lor$ - (P) - $1 \spadesuit$) and we never miss our 4-4 fit. Never. I strongly dislike Michaels here and

discourage partners from bidding that way. Save that two-suited cuebid for 55+ shapes.



Bob Jones $2 \checkmark$ Bid $2 \checkmark$. Partner will bid $2 \spadesuit$ next if he has four of them.

Steve Vogel 2 Partner's 2 bid does not deny 4 spades, so I choose to rebid 2S over bidding 2NT (which in our system shows 6+ hearts). Over partner's expected 2NT or 3 rebid, I will bid 3 showing 4-6 shape in the majors.

Joe Muenks 2♥ With minimum hands with a 6 card major I like to open then rebid 2 of that major, like here. I do not deny 4 spades, so partner might bid those next.

Bob Fisk 2♠ During an auction, your job is to show partner as many of your cards as you can without cheating. If you simply rebid 2♥ here to show your sixth Heart, you've shown partner six cards. If you rebid 2♠ here, you've shown partner nine cards. Nine is more than six (I checked that on Wikipedia). If partner doesn't raise either major with their rebid, you'll bid 3♥.

Steve Moese 2 We have an easy rebid here showing 9+ of our cards instead of only 6 of them. We can show our 6th heart next. 2S does not show extra values.
