# FINISH SOONER WITHOUT PLAYING FASTER

Duplicate Bridge is a timed event, and while allowances are made for Intermediate/Novice players, it should still be the goal of every player to finish a round in the allotted time. There is nothing more frustrating for a pair than to follow two slow players and never be able to begin a round on time. Being a good duplicate neighbor includes trying our best to be ready to move when the director calls the round. The following suggestions may help:

1. Greet each opponent with a smile and say "Hello" while you are sitting down and removing your cards from the board.
2. A quick glance at the board when removing your cards will enable you to note the vulnerability as well as the dealer. Remember to count your cards when you take them out of the board and again before you put them back.
3. If you are the opening leader, make your lead first, **THEN** record the contract while everyone else is planning their play. This way, the other three players won't have to wait while you record the contract. If you are dummy, after you place your hand on the table you will have plenty of time to record the contract. Wait for the opening lead, then place your hand on the table, **THEN** record the contract. If you are declarer or partner of the opening leader, record the contract immediately while the opening lead is being made and the dummy is being face. Then you will be ready to play without further interruption.
4. Declarer should take a little time before playing to the first trick and plan how the contract will be played. Consider what information has been gained from the auction and the opening lead, and use this information to plan the play. In a suit contract are there losers to be eliminated? Is there a side suit that can be set up? In a notrump contract how many winners do you have and how many more do you need? Where will they come from? Is there transportation between the two hands? Defenders should also pause before playing to the first trick to do their own planning. Defenders should take some time to study dummy and try to figure out where declarer may have problems. Thinking before playing to the first trick will save considerable time during the rest of the hand.
5. As soon as the number of tricks taken and the score is agreed upon, count your cards and put your hand back in the board. North should record the score on the pick-up slip, turn the boards for the next hand, and **THEN** record the score on his/her private score sheet. Everyone else may record the score on their private sheets while North is taking care of business.
6. **SAVE POSTMORTEMS UNTIL YOU HAVE FINISHED THE ROUND.** You may discuss the hands briefly **only** if there is still time left in the round. More than anything else, discussing hands immediately after they have been played slows the game. Good players rarely discuss hands until the entire game is over.

You will notice that nothing has been said about bidding your hand faster, playing your cards faster, or making up your mind sooner. These suggestions should make your game go more smoothly and should also improve your matchpoint score. Remember that Duplicate Bridge is a timed event, and part of the competition is how well you do in the allotted amount of time. Use your time wisely!

# MORE BASICS: THIRD HAND LEAD/RETURN vs. NT Opening leaders continuation decision

**Problem:** Above are three possible distributions of one suit. You are on lead against a 3NT contract and lead the 4 of this suit. Your partner wins the King and returns the suit. In all three hands, declarer plays the 10 at trick two and you win the Jack. How do you continue the defense? Obviously, in #1, you play the Ace because you know the Queen will fall. But what about layouts two and three? Is this simply a guess situation?

**Solution:** When returning partner's "long suit opening lead vs. NT," return second best from an original two or three card suit and return fourth best from an original four+ card suit.

Thus, in Hand 2, return the 3 (original fourth best). After winning the Jack, West will count East as holding 4 cards and will know that it is right to continue by playing the Ace. In Hand 3, return the 6 (original second best). Now West will count partner as holding 2 or 3 cards and will know that the Queen will not drop under the Ace.

West leads the 2 of Hearts. East plays the Queen and declarer wins the Ace. Needing two Diamond tricks to make the hand, declarer plays the King of Diamonds at trick two and East wins the Ace. East plays the 8 of Hearts (original 2<sup>nd</sup> best from three cards), declarer plays 9 and West wins the 10. West knows not to continue Hearts because to do so will set up declarer's Jack. Any switch happens to work here and declarer will lose at east five tricks. If West had tried to cash out the Heart suit, declarer would score two Hearts tricks and make the contract.

Again, West leads the 2 of Hearts, East plays the Queen and declarer wins the Ace. Declarer continues by playing the King of Diamonds and East wins the Ace. This time East plays the 3 of Hearts (original 4<sup>th</sup> best), declarer plays the 9 and West again wins the 10. Knowing that East started with four Hearts, West can play the King and the last Heart. On this hand, this defense holds declarer to nine tricks. If West does not cash out the Heart suit, declarer scores ten tricks.

Again, West leads the 2 of Hearts. This time East wins the Ace and returns the 3 (original 4<sup>th</sup> best). West wins this trick and knows that declarer only has one more Heart. Thus, West continues Hearts and the defense holds declarer to nine tricks.

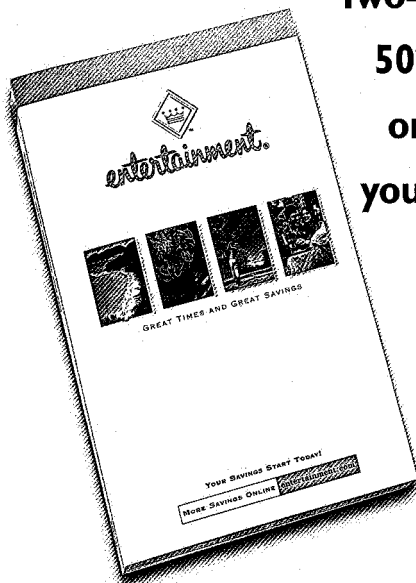
The Award is based on four factors:

## Board Meeting Summaries

**Complete minutes of each board meeting are posted on the bulletin board. Board meetings are held the second Tuesday of every month at 6:00 PM/ All CBA members are welcome to attend.**

**May 9, 2000.** Present: Brewer, Fisher, Higgins, Kieffer, Levinson, H. Norris, J. Norris, Pappas, Reid, Sachs, Swango, Walter, Wolber. Absent: Muenks, Stifel. Visitor: Judy Cohn. April showed a profit of just \$213. Table count was 477 opposed to the April 1999 count of 501. A near-final recap of the March 2000 NABC in Cincinnati showed a substantial profit of about \$41,000, due to conservative budgeting and management, strong attendance, and a \$7.00 per table rebate from the ACBL (versus an expected \$6.50). Our Unit should make its recommendation on the equitable distribution of these funds between our Unit and District 11 at the July District Meeting in Indianapolis. A Unit 24 volunteer party will be held at the CBA on Friday, July 14, 2000. The mentoring program will begin 5/10 and culminate with a dinner and game at the CBA on Friday, 9/8. The CBA will assume control and ownership of the Monday Night game at the CBA, as well as the Tuesday and Wednesday evening games. Easy Bridge is temporarily out of action due to Marvin Comer's illness. The 2000 Holiday Party has been tentatively set for 6:00 Friday, 12/1/00, at the Holiday Inn off 275N.

**June 13, 2000.** Present: H. Norris, J. Norris, Sachs, Muenks, Wolber, Fisher, Pappas, Reid. Absent: Levinson, Brewer, Stifel, Walter, Swango, Higgins, Kieffer. Visitor: Travis. We netted \$536 in May. Table count was an impressive 651 tables in May, representing a new record for the CBA. Last year we had 606.5 tables. The distribution of the Nationals profits still must be finalized. The Nationals volunteer party will be limited to volunteers and will be held 7/14 with Montgomery Inn catering. The 2001 Spring Sectional is being bumped from the Sharonville Convention Center. A date move is likely. The 2001 Summer Regional will start on Monday night. Homestyle games will be included Monday night and Wednesday afternoon. The 299er is set for 6/24-25 at the bridge center. The NAOP Unit finals will be held Saturday 10/22. The awards game was fun for all and had 22 tables. The Charity game had 17.5 tables. The raffle alone raised \$1250. A new icemaker is being purchased. The plastic-coated bid box cards will be purchased for most tables in the bridge center. Stand-by partners will be offered for the Monday and Wednesday games as well as the Tuesday game starting after the mentoring program. 92 pairs have been arranged for the mentoring program. A new cleaning company is needed. An ALERT editor is being sought. A new Sunday afternoon game is being considered for the fall with 0-99 and open sections.

**July 11, 2000.** Present: H. Norris, Sachs, J. Norris, Muenks, Wolber, Pappas, Reid, Walter, Brewer, Swango, Levinson. Absent: Stifel, Higgins, Kieffer. Visitor: Travis. We lost \$2344 in the month of June. The distribution of the Nationals profits will be \$10,000 to the District and the remaining \$30,000 or so to the CBA. Judy Cohn NABC treasurer, will present the money

to the District at their next meeting. The volunteer party is arranged with about 74 attendees expected. A new ice machine has been bought and installed. The library has a second bookcase. The hours and contacts are posted. More durable plastic bidding box inserts have been ordered. Sectional attendance improved versus 1999. The profit will be about \$2,000. The Summer 2001 Regional schedule was approved after adding a Tuesday Senior Pairs event. The STaC is set for 11/6-11/12 with Sunday likely to be a one session Swiss team event. In 2001 the NAOP finals will be held Saturday 1/27/01, the GNT 3/10-3/11/01, and two 299er tournaments 5/5-5/6/01 and 9/15-16/01 (provided the District approves these dates at their next meeting). Mike Hess has been named to the board for the term expiring 2002 previously held by Howard Stifel. Carolyn Ahlert will take over ALERT editor duties from Carole Miller. It is suggested that e-mail addresses of members be made available on our website ([cincybridge.com](http://cincybridge.com)) on a volunteer basis. Entertainment books will be sold again this year. Travelers use is at the discretion of the directors.

**August 8, 2000.** Present: H. Norris, Sachs, J. Norris, Muenks, Wolber, Pappas, Reid, Walter, Brewer, Swango, Fisher, Higgins, Kieffer. Absent: Hess, Levinson. We made \$155 in July. Expenses included the ice maker (\$1,467) and the 2nd library cabinet (\$588). So far 5 candidates have submitted nomination forms for the Board's 5 openings. At least a few others have shown interest. Two 299er tournaments are scheduled for 2001 (5/5-6 and 9/15-16). The Unit Final for the NAOP will be Sunday 10/22 at 11 am and TBD with entries \$8/person per session as in 1999. The STAC in November will include open games Wed am, Thur pm, Fri pm, Sat pm and a half-Swiss on Sunday. A new game run by Sharon Harper starts 9/12/00 in Springboro. The District is studying Regionals. We are the largest unit in our district with 993 members. Our 9.12% growth rate is first in the District and 19th out of 309 ACBL Units Nationally. Our retention rate of 56.64% rates first in District 11 and 49th overall. Only 16.6% of our 0-100 players played in a Sectional in the past year, but this compares to an even worse 10.4% average for the ACBL as a whole. We have 11 Life Masters so far this year. Barb Levinson is heading up the selling of Entertainment books. The ALERT deadline is 9/8/00. Send material to Carolyn Ahlert.. Results of the membership survey are posted in the Bridge Center.
